Dekalita Receives Nick Vuckovich Award

There's a special kind of pride when one of our own gets recognized not just for what they do inside the plant, but for the difference they make outside of it. On September 26, our brother Nick Dekalita, who serves as the 2nd Shift, Shop Committee-at-Large on our Local 598 Bargaining Committee, was presented with the Nick Vuckovich Community Service Award by the United Way of Genesee County.

The award, named after the late community leader Nick Vuckovich, honors individuals who embody his spirit of volunteerism, compassion, and service to others. Established by the United Way of Genesee County to recognize exceptional community leadership, the award continues Vuckovich's legacy of bringing people together for the greater good.

Nick earned this honor through his leadership in the UAW/ United Way Wheelchair Ramp Program, a partnership that has built more than 4,600 ramps for elderly and disabled residents across Genesee County since the program started in the mid-1980s. As head of the "All Ramped Up" crew, Nick organizes volunteers, coordinates builds, and is always right there in the mix, toolbelt on and sleeves rolled up. What makes his service even more remarkable is that Nick builds these ramps on his own time, after work, on weekends, and whenever someone in the community needs help. The ramps his team builds do more than provide access. They restore independence, dignity, and hope for our neighbors who might otherwise feel trapped in their own

I have personally known Nick for years, and have worked with him on the Bargaining Committee. Nick has always been the same kind, encouraging, and good-humored guy, no matter what's going on around him. Nick's attitude never changes. He is the kind of person who makes you want to do just a little bit more, and have a way better day.

PTT/FTT Benefits By The Numbers

With the upcoming downtime, there are certain details I would like to share. First, as always, it is a temporary layoff and is subject to change. The first day of layoff is January 5, 2026. The time period prior is a contractual holiday pay. Each day of the Christmas break is an individual holiday, not one block. Therefore, Part-Time Temporary (PTT) have to qualify for each holiday separately, using the 3 out of 5 days worked requirement.

All seniority and Full-Time Temporary (FTT) will receive unemployment and SUB pay. This equates to about 75% of your regular pay. This benefit for FTT is new in the 2023 National Agreement.

PTT will receive unemployment benefits. The maximum benefit increases to \$530 in 2026. The temporary layoff does not affect a temporary employee's continuous service date, nor does it reset or add time to the 9-month requirement for conversion that will happen on the original timeline. Layoff weeks do not count toward profit sharing or FMLA eligibility.

The membership in the material department have been frustrated with equipment problems for some time now. We have been pressing the company for new equipment, which they got, but unfortunately they made a mess of it.

We have now negotiated a joint committee to review and improve material equipment. They have reviewed every piece of equipment for every job. The committee is part of this material equipment group and is advocating on our members behalf. They are properly assigning new forklifts and tuggers to remove the worst equipment. They have identified and begun replacing the worst batteries. They are auditing and repairing chargers. They have worked with Aramark to improve the turnaround of equipment from repair. They improved both their point of use parts and ordering system. They are working on a process to ensure trucks get assigned back where they came from after repair including a loaner system. Hopefully, this hard work will be felt by our members and will make their jobs easier.

We have an emerging issue in the plant surrounding employee vehicle discounts. Flint Assembly, along with Arlington, have the highest level of discount fraud. Employees are selling their *GM Family First* login information. That information is used to get authorization numbers for employee vehicle discounts and the member is typically getting \$150, through *Cash App* or *Venmo*, every time they get an authorization number. The employee is

notified by *GM Family First* whenever an authorization number is generated with a letter in the mail.

Some of these employees have sold 15-20 authorization numbers. This is fraud in some cases \$60k-70K. We have had 7 people lose their jobs due to this fraudulent activity, and there are more still coming, as they investigate.

I have heard that "the Union is letting people get fired with no evidence." That is not true and in most cases, when the member is faced with the evidence, they admit to the fraud.

I know there is a lot of dissatisfaction within our PTT pool that we are not converting fast enough, stating that we are the only location in Michigan that takes that long, so I am going to clarify a few things. Yes, it does take a long time, but the Shop Committee does not let an opportunity slip by us. We know it's important. The fact that we have a large time pool is the reason it takes so long to get to an FTT offer. It is also the reason you are working here in line to be converted.

We all reported out numbers at the last sub-council meeting. Local 598 has 91 FTT, 462 PTT, and we converted 276 since the 2023NA.

Other Locals' Reported Numbers...

- Local 652, LGR, 41 FTT, no PTT, and converted 61
- · Local 602, LDT, 168 FTT, no PTT, and converted 634
- Local 22, DHAM has 0 FTT, no PTT, and converted 1,108 (all temps, about 750 got laid off)
- Local 651, Davison Rd. CCA, 0 FTT, no PTT, laid off all FTT to put laid off DHAM folks to work
- Local 659, Engine, 30 FTT, 15 PTT, and converted 0
- Local 163, Romulus, 35 FTT, no PTT, and converted 118
- Local 167, Grand Rapids, GMCH, 0 FTT, no PTT, and converted 46
- Local 668 Saginaw casting 7 FTT, 18 PTT, and converted 6

These are the locations I have data for with limited insight to their locations. We have converted more and faster than all but 2 locations. DHAM, which added a shift, after recalls they had no voluntary transfers answer the posting. LDT has historically converted a lot of temporary employees. Once again, it's a location that added a shift and no one wants to transfer to which free them up to convert outside the automatic conversion. When we added a shift, we got 1,300 workers transferred in due to layoffs. Arlington Assembly has a similar size temp pool (148 FTT and 562 PTT), but had only converted 193. Similar pool size takes just as long, but we convert more.

A fundamental thing that is being missed is the number of PTT at other locations. Most locations have zero. Since we have a larger PTT pool, it's easier for people to get hired as a PTT here then wait "in line" for an FTT offer and eventual conversion. In locations that only have FTT, the people are having to wait on the outside hoping to get through the GM hiring process for a few spots, so there is no telling how long they are waiting to get in.

The move away from EV greatly affects Michigan. Sites like DHAM, Orion and LGR were all supposed to be EV sites. Orion is going to breathe new life with great ICE products, but will further delay the need for workers. This transition has extended the precarious situation that workers in Michigan have been in and puts the company in a position where they already have too many workers until Orion comes on line. This slows down conversion at every location.
































Supporting MAKING STRIDES

In 2017, when I first got involved with *Making Strides*, I didn't know a single person who had breast cancer. I had noticed that many of my UAW peers had certain causes that they would rally behind. I figured, I should follow suit and breast cancer seemed like a good charity to me. I would see the *Detroit News* coverage of the walk every year, and I've always liked the color pink.

My family never had a history of cancer, but I always thought... who knows what the future holds? Preventing unnecessary, early deaths could only be a good thing.

Because women's health is so often ignored by the medical community, I imagined that any advancements in breast cancer research would help further the cause of eliminating all cancers. Until the day comes, when cancer is no longer a death sentence, we fight.

The UAW Local 598 Women's Committee has carried on with our

fundraising, with *Bowling for Breast Cancer Awareness*, held on Sunday, October 5th. Teams of bowlers and spectators gathered at B's bowling center dressed in pink. Thank you to everyone who participated and supported this event. Because of your generosity, we raised \$1,469!

The support from our annual breast cancer awareness t-shirt

sales raised another \$488. In the plant, Flint Assembly is also working towards raising additional funds with the pink safety glasses, the football toss fundraiser, and a gift basket raffle. We have also been submitting the names of participants to the GM "Dollars for Doers" campaign, which matches our donations.

Currently, we have surpassed our goal of \$5,000!

As of the morning of the *Making Strides-Flint Walk* on

Saturday, October 11th, we have raised \$7,255.69 for our UAW Local 598/ Flint Assembly Team. We anticipate more donations still, with the plant continuing it's fundraising efforts through the end of October.

In the eight years that have passed since my first *Making Strides* walk, four of my family members have been diagnosed with cancer. Although none of them had breast cancer, I like to think that the fundraising that we do does impact all forms of cancer. I have seen how early detection has saved lives. Not to mention, I
